"So what turns dreams into reality? An unwavering belief that you can and will achieve your goals," Kathleen once said. Kathleen believed that each and every one of us is now in a position to proactively assume leadership roles and to continue to evolve the HIM profession. She also knew that AHIMA stands beside its members as a champion, supporting them throughout their career and acting as a guiding light for the entire profession.

As President/Chair-elect, Angela Kennedy will assume Kathleen's role immediately and carry AHIMA through the rest of 2013.
