Learning-The Mission of AHIMA

Finding the Time

Professional development is not an event that occurs on a particular day; rather, it must be part of daily work life for professionals. But this requires time to read, visit the Communities of Practice, take Web courses, and attend seminars. It requires time to reflect on the lessons of the work day, which is very hard to do in our over-scheduled lives. In "Master Plan" Zada Clarke and Angela M. Hill advise that a professional development plan can ensure that learning is deliberate and takes you in the direction you want to go. Reflections from HIM colleagues bear this out. Their stories demonstrate that professional development plans can be road maps for advancing your career.

In "HIM Laboratory" Sandra Kersten, Mohit Saigal, and Kathie Owens describe a new technology funded by AHIMA and FORE to support HIM student learning. The Virtual Lab brings e-HIM® technologies to the student laboratory via the Web, thereby enabling schools to offer student experiences that would otherwise be beyond their reach.

For many in our field, professional development plans involve earning or advancing an academic degree. In "Back to School" Ruth Carol introduces us to colleagues who are earning advanced degrees. Their professional development plans call for earning a master's, doctoral, or law degree and finishing that bachelor or associate degree. Thousands of HIM professionals are advancing academically as evidenced by the fact that in just 10 years the share of AHIMA members with master's degrees has doubled, from 8 to 16 percent.
