## **Improving Personal Health Data**

Last year, President Bush issued an executive order specifically calling for greater quality and pricing transparency, expanded incentives and efficiencies in healthcare, and implementation of health IT standards to facilitate greater exchange of health information.

The more ideas put forth to empower the public to better evaluate its own healthcare, the better the chances are of achieving overall improved population health. Having said that, standard clinical terminologies will be essential to interoperable exchange of health information between EHR systems as we shape the healthcare system of the future.
