## The Audits Keep Coming: Preparing Systems for Claims, Privacy, and Security Audits

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What do people dread the most? It should come as no surprise to learn that, for many of us, public speaking is near the top of the list of most-feared activities.

No matter how competent or confident we are in fulfilling our personal and professional duties, it's normal to feel apprehensive when we must perform in front of and be judged by strangers.

The public speaker, the student taking an exam, the hospital administrator facing a Joint Commission inspection, the child performing in a school recital-whatever the circumstance in which we're put to the test, it's human nature to second-guess ourselves or worry that we may not live up to the expectations of others.

## HIM's Audit Fears

In HIM, perhaps the most daunting external reviews we face are RAC audits of Medicare claims and HIPAA privacy and security audits conducted by the Office for Civil Rights. No matter how prepared we are or how much care we take to follow the letter of the law, there is always the worry that maybe we haven't done enough.

HIM professionals are faced with the difficult and complex job of making sure our internal systems are up to meeting the requirements of these audits, and we face many challenges. For example, we must:

- Provide support and educate staff to respond to RAC requests
- Ensure the ability to efficiently track RAC cases and outcomes
- Prepare for the rebuttal and appeal processes

As of January 1, 2012, the task became even more challenging with the addition of the permanent RAC Medicaid program, new demonstration projects, and Part A to Part B rebilling audits. Prepayment Review and Prior Authorization of Power Mobility Device demonstrations have been delayed while CMS reviews public comments, but their implementation is expected in the near future.
