What an exciting time for our profession! As the leaders in HIM, we are being recognized as valuable resources in analyzing and assessing the recently published standards for privacy of individually identifiable health information. When these regulations were announced by President Clinton before a relatively small, invitation-only audience, AHIMA was represented by our Washington, DC, associates, Dan Rode and Don Asmonga. This was confirmation that the Department of Health and Human Services recognized AHIMA's contributions in formulating regulations that are so important for the protection of the health information privacy of individuals throughout the United States.

Now it is our responsibility-and opportunity-to read the regulations and assess their impact on our work environments. Further, we should look at these regulations as a golden opportunity to display our expertise. Protecting the privacy of health information has always been one of the pillars of our profession. Now, these regulations embody and manifest some of our basic tenets for maintaining health information privacy.

Make sure you are the first in your organization to read these regulations and understand their impact. And let your employer know you are the expert on these regulations. We have missed other tailor-made health information opportunities after other healthcare professionals staked them out for their own. But the protection of health information privacy is unquestionably our issue.

## Take Another Look at FORE

Have you ever considered a contribution to FORE, the Foundation of Research and Education? FORE funds both undergraduate and graduate scholarships for outstanding students in HIA and HIT programs across the country. In 2000, 36 students received FORE scholarships. However, FORE had received more than 96 requests for scholarships from qualified applicants. Consequently, more than 60 outstanding students did not receive financial support that would have made it easier for them to pursue or continue their HIA or HIT education.

## Developing the Profession through Research

In addition to scholarships, FORE also funds a grant-in-aid program that provides funding for research into HIM issues. FORE funded two grants in 2000: research into the content and structure of electronic medical records (EMRs) and an investigation of direct entry into the EMR and the physician-patient relationship. We must acknowledge the value of funding research and make financial support available for those who help us look into the future.

A recent grant-in-aid recipient wrote, "Not only does the grant-in-aid program provide funds and opportunities for HIM researchers, it also provides HIM students the opportunities to work on these projects, which will enable them to conduct research on their own someday. All in all, the program is a very vital part of AHIMA."
